California Art Club's 100th annual Gold Medal Juried Exhibition takes place April 3 to 24.










Karen Winters, Gaviota Springtime, oil, 11 x 14"




Ann Sanders, Morning Cliffs, pastel, 10 x 8"



created by the Club's pioneering founding artists. The *Gold Medal Juried Exhibition* is the hallmark annual event. Some of the stops for the exhibitions include Bakersfield Museum of Art in Bakersfield; California Historical

Society in San Francisco; The Irvine Museum in Irvine and the California Art Club Gallery at The Old Mill in San Marino.

This event series will coincide with the launch of the book, California Light: A Century of Landscapes/Paintings of the California Art Club. The book, which will feature 300 landscape paintings by historic and contemporary members of the Club, is from Rizzoli International and documents the

Club's history.


Early California Impressionists or plein air painters established the California Art Club, which is headquartered in Pasadena, in 1909. It is recognized as one of the oldest, largest and most active professional art organizations in the world.

Artists participating in this year's Gold Medal Juried Exhibition include: Peter Adams, Karen Winters, Kim Lordier, Cindy Jackson, Robin Purcell, Ann Sanders, Charles Waldman, Carol Peek and Matthew Joseph Peak.

Kim Lordier's piece for the exhibition, *Tucson Eve*, a pastel on archival board, is the product of a recent trip to the Arizona city.

"The first time I set up my easel on the arid plains of the desert to paint the landscape it felt like Mars," recalls Lordier, "as I had only painted my Northern California environs. Many years later—with several painting trips to the Southwest; continued studied of the early California impressionists, Taos Society of Artists and artists like Maynard Dixon and Nicolai Fechin—I am entranced by the beauty of the desert. *Tucson Eve* is the product of a recent trip to Tucson and I am honored to have the painting included in the 100th annual *Gold Medal Juried Exhibition* of the California Art Club, which honors the tradition of representational painting

and artists of the past and present."

In his piece, Red Amber Buddha with Bronze Tara, Peter Adams shows his intrigue of Asian cultures.

"I have always been intrigued by the ancient mysteries of Asian cultures," explains Adams. "Using the low light cast by a single candle, the backlit Sukhothai red amber Buddha is overshadowed by the larger bronze figure of Tara—the Tibetan deity of compassion and protection. The spatial relationship and play of light between the two figures is intended to create a sense of haunting mystery."




